<p><u>Examination Visit - Present 366.</u></p> <p>1. <u>Ground.</u> A substantial new picket fence was erected this year. There are sufficient trees for the area. The garden on an adjoining railway reserve suffered considerably during the recent drought. The formation of a garden in the Eastern portion of the school ground should now receive consideration.</p> <p>2. <u>Buildings and Furniture.</u> The class rooms are kept in good order. Some of the desks are not free from scribbling - the cleaning of the tops might be undertaken. Sanitary arrangements and play-pavilions are satisfactory. Maintenance duties are performed. Aft. sun. On Friday evening a number of pupils showed interest in obtaining library books. There is a very good stock of pictures and decorative material.</p> <p>3. <u>Organization:</u> For some considerable time the school was without a head teacher; the 1st M.A. was transferred on 11th June. A R.T. took charge on the 14th June. A teacher of a neighbouring country school undergoing repairs has had charge of the Supplementary Course for a few days. The permanent H.T. arrived on the last day of the examination. Time Tables are neat and framed and appear to provide satisfactorily for the Course of Instruction. Work programs are carefully kept. The time table providing for practice lessons for the junior teacher requires to be drawn up on a more elaborate scale. There is evidence of Curiosity and Example lessons having received due attention.</p>	<p>A carefully conceived assembly has been carried on - a few pupils paid insufficient heed to drum beats during the marching - the singing in the assembly hall is a pleasing feature of the morning. The newly transferred 1st M.A. examined the school in May and recorded the results. The 1st P.A. has the organization of the Infant Dept. thoroughly in hand and is determined to reduce the retardations to a minimum. Having to the number of changes in the staff retarded pupils in the middle of the school have not necessarily received the forcible help advisable. This matter should now again be taken up spiritedly. Spoken teaching and private study should on the lines indicated should be put into operation. The present staffing demands some help in class work from the incoming H.T. in the matter of attending to retardations and methods for strengthening weaknesses. The p.c. of promotions = 88.7. On the whole, good progress has been made with the year's work; but some of the work is not quite up to expectations from this particular school. Grade III requires extra attention to reading and spelling - this grade is still suffering from the pupils' weaknesses of last year - a more determined effort can be made here, transcription for home lessons to be followed by dictation of the same extract is recommended. The whole of the Supplementary Course might well be managed on the lines indicated in last year's Gazette by the 1st M.A. This would set a teacher free to assist on alternate weeks with English and Mathematics to retarded pupils in the large grades IV, V. The Spelling of grade IV has been discussed with the H.T.</p>

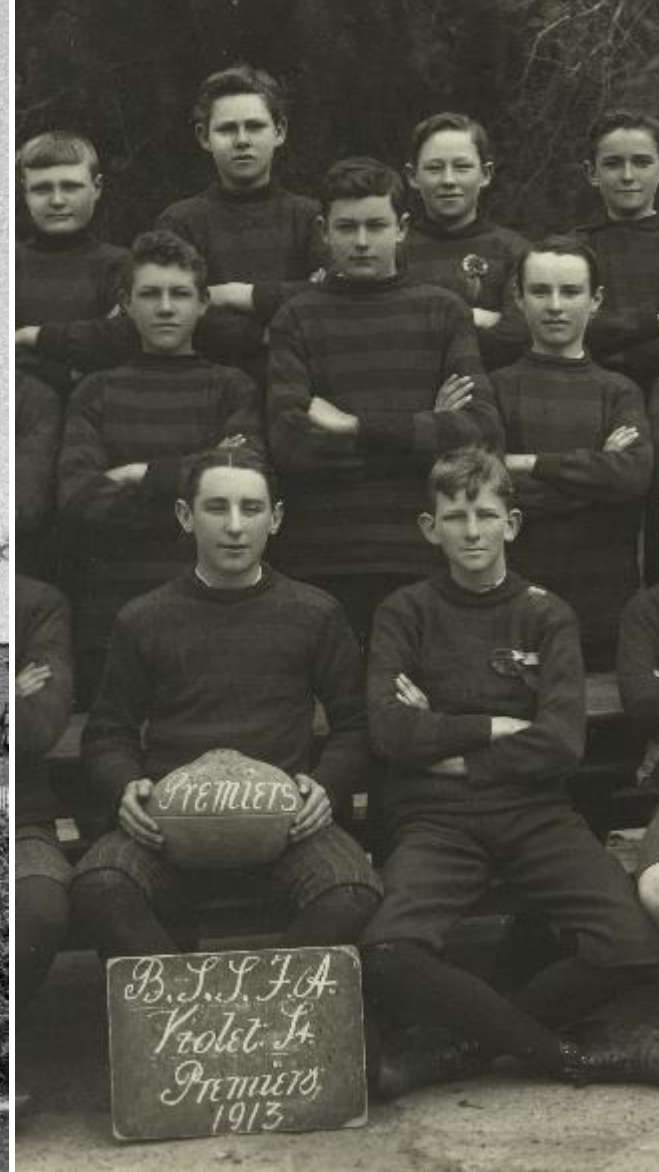
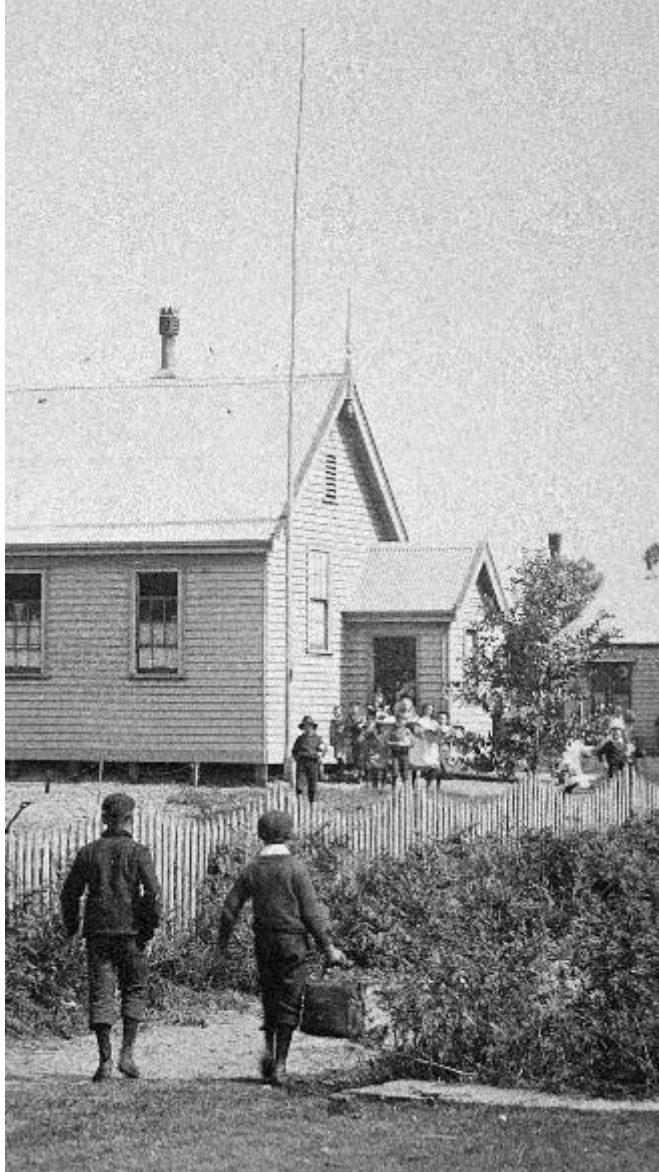

Rediscovering history



- Previously unknown to the school, these pupil registers were unearthed during a recent visit
- School believed they held a single register. They had 40.
- The pupil registers dated from 1950s to 1990s

Progress to date

- Archiving support has been provided to 360 open schools so far (including over 165 of the oldest open schools in the state)
- More than 660 collections have been digitised and are being prepared for transfer to State Archives
- Over 100,000 unique records digitised



School Records Transfer Program

- 3-year partnership with PROV
- Commenced in September 2023
- Aiming to transfer 500+ school collections
- First transfer under the program occurred in February 2024, 11 school collections!
- MANY more to come!





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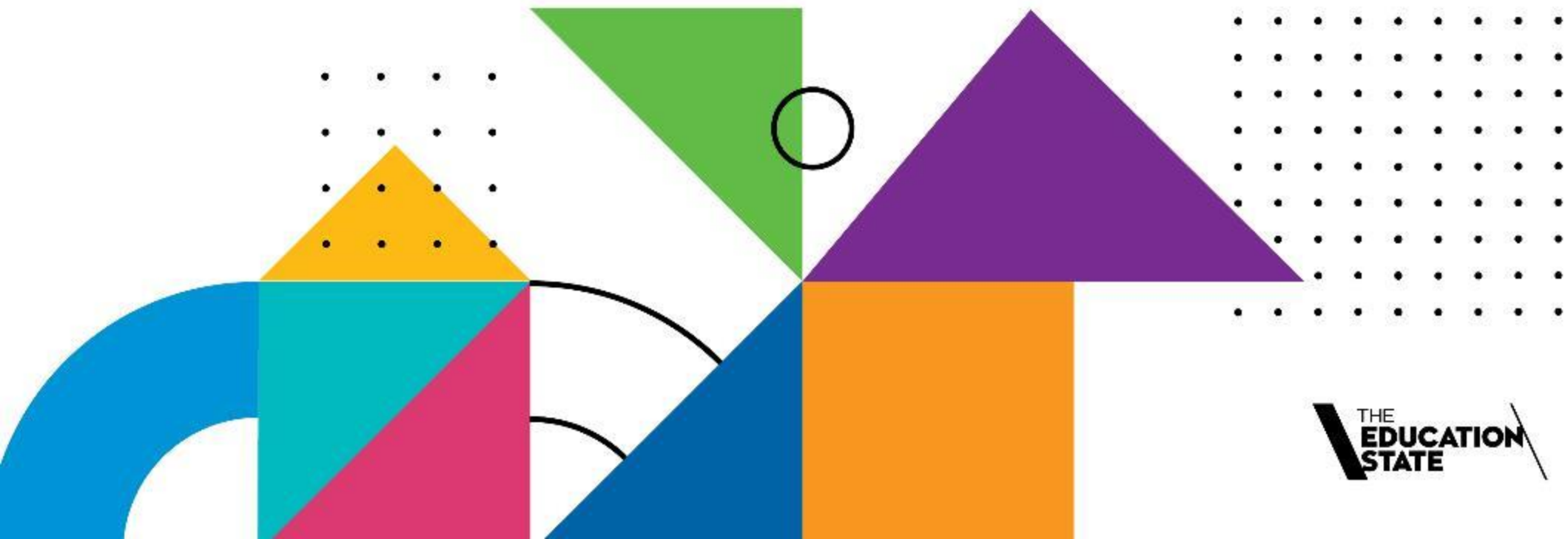
